For half of SMEs, cybersecurity is their biggest challenge. And the threat is real—every second, a UK business faces an attack. The primary culprits? Ransomware, data leaks, and hackers from China and Russia.






Phishing: The #1 Cyber Threat to SMEs

Among these threats, phishing stands out as the biggest risk—accounting for 84% of attacks. A single fake email or link can lead to massive financial and data losses, making employee training essential.

The most common cyber threats SMEs face include:


Network attacks (44.5%) – Breaching company systems remotely.

Ransomware (35%) – Locking data for ransom.

Software vulnerabilities (32%) – Exploiting outdated software.

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The Cybersecurity Gap: SMEs vs. Big Corporations

Large corporations, with their deep pockets and expert teams, manage cybersecurity better. SMEs, however, struggle due to:

- Limited budgets High-cost security solutions are unaffordable.
- Lack of expertise No dedicated IT security teams.
- **Resource constraints** Inability to constantly monitor and update security.
- Employee awareness gaps Lack of proper training increases risks.

As cyber threats grow, the government is tightening laws—making it mandatory for SMEs to take action.
